



Strategic

Strategic Coordinating Group (SCG)

- Sets strategic direction
- Coordinator responding agencies
- Prioritises scarce resources

Tactical

Tactical Coordinating Group (TCG)

- Interprets strategic direction
- Coordinates activities and assets in area of operations

Operational

Police

Fire & Rescue

Ambulance

Other responders

- Executes tactical plan
- Commands single service response
- Coordinates actions at the scene

- temporary/longer term accommodation.

Recovery


"Recovery is defined as a process of rebuilding, restoring and rehabilitating the community following an emergency. Although distinct from the response phase, recovery should be an integral part of the response from the very beginning, as actions taken during the response phase can influence the longer-term outcomes for a community."



When does Recovery Start



"At the earliest opportunity following the onset of an emergency often running in tandem with the response"

• Be informed about the risks in your local area

- find out if you are eligible to sign up to a priority services register
- Find out what actions you should take in an emergency


Prepare

HOUSEHOLD EMERGENCY PLAN

About the household emergency plan

Writing down some important information now will help you and any others you live with be ready for emergencies. Having a plan written down could help you in situations where you have no electricity, phone, or internet connection.

Download this plan and fill it in. Discuss it with those you live with. Print it out - or write it out - and keep it somewhere safe and easy to find in a power cut.

In an emergency

If the emergency is outside the home then:

- Go in depending on the emergency you might need to close all windows and doors
- Stay in
- Tune in monitor national and local news and follow official advice for what to do next - check local radio stations and local TV broadcasts and other trusted sources, such as your local emergency services social media accounts

If the emergency is inside the home then:

- Get out
- Stay out
- Ring 999

Meeting point

Check in

- •Talk to others about emergency planning and getting prepared.
- •Swap contact details with neighbours and consider creating a closed online social network for your community or whatsapp group to stay in touch during an emergency
- •Consider designating a location within your community as a Community Emergency Hubs these are often church halls, village halls or even pubs and it's a place for communities to go if they need information, support or a cup of tea.
- •Check if your neighbours, friends or family may need any extra help during an emergency
- •Make a plan for checking in on neighbours, friends and family members during an emergency
