## Progress update April 2021

## Welcome

Cornwall Council is leading the South West Property Flood Resilience (PFR) Pathfinder Project, on behalf of the Lead Local Flood Authorities (LLFAs) in the South West Regional Flood and Coastal Committee (RFCC) Region. This Defra funded project aims to increase the awareness and uptake of PFR measures in both residential and commercial settings across the South West.

In the South West, we are fortunate to be working with our key partners to be able to deliver the best possible outcomes for our communities.

The SW PFR Pathfinder has been running since September 2019, and we are now delighted to announce we have a six-month extension to end of September 2021.

As you'll find out in this newsletter, the SW PFR Pathfinder and the BeFloodReady (BRF) campaign will have a long lasting impact on residents, businesses and communities at flood risk beyond September 2021.

## **Baseline Report**

Collowing consultation with key partners, including the Environment Agency (EA) and Risk Management Authorities (RMAs) the Baseline report was published at the end of 2020.

The report highlights the majority of schemes have been completed by Local Authorities (LAs), either as part of the early Defra Pilot, or countywide grant schemes, with a few schemes completed by the EA across Devon, Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. Crucially, the report also recommends the urgent need to mainstream PFR across the South West. The Baseline study has guided many subsequent work packages, and in turn will evolve as other work packages progress.

Currently, 30+ PFR schemes have now been completed across the South West, and over 720 properties have been provided with PFR as part of organised funding schemes, although this does not take into account

private installation of PFR which is very difficult to quantify.

Heartlands is a major visitor attraction that is also used by the local community, and hosts many events, including: bonfire night, Christmas markets, café and conferencing facilities, which are all hugely popular. We



intend to make our BeFloodReady Pathfinder part of these events. It also has a licenced bar and restaurant, on-site parking facilities and is a 4-minute drive from the A30.

This will have interactive displays on how

Seeing is believing, and we believe by seeing first-hand how PFR measures work in flood conditions, the benefits of making a home or business flood resilient will shine through. Entry to the demonstration site will be free and open to all. Opening hours will appear on the BFR website prior to the

centre opening. We are looking at expanding our offer, being present at events, and possibly relocating staff to be available during working hours. Smaller guided tours and training sessions will also be available for many groups, including: community flood groups, flood risk professionals and schools.

Heartlands will be a legacy of the BeFloodReady Pathfinder for years to come.

## **Topsham Case Study**

As part of the SW PFR BeFloodReady Pathfinder project, we have secured some additional funding to study the long-term effectiveness of PFR in a community at flood risk.

Very little information is known about the legacy provided by PFR in terms of effectiveness, ongoing preparedness and levels of protection, something considered as vital for increasing confidence in PFR.

The community of Topsham on the Exe Estuary has been chosen for this study due to its history of PFR installation and the active Topsham Emergency Group (TEG).

It is believed that between 60 and 70 properties in Topsham have had PFR installed,

35 of which were via the Repair and Renew Government Grant following the 2014 floods. Many properties in the community have also privately funded PFR.

A successful workshop was held with the TEG in January 2021 to understand flood risk in the community.

In the next stage of the project, questionnaires and audit visits will be used to understand how PFR has been provided throughout the community. We also hope to assist TEG to organise a flood exercise, so we can understand how PFR fits into wider flood preparedness in the community.

We hope that this study will provide valuable information on the legacy of PFR that will be used to improve PFR delivery nationally.

## **Perranwell Case Study**

As part of the SW PFR Pathfinder this case study will focus on the Parish of Perranwell; a small village made up of approximately 750 properties which includes a public house and a specialist vintage car garage.

The village has suffered several floods over the years which is mostly caused by the river that runs through the centre of the village. The project will focus on the Public house, garage and ten domestic dwellings with scope to expand following initial findings.

An initial property owner survey will be carried out to determine risk appetite and current level of PFR. We will also identify through the surveys any issues with obtaining insurance and property owners awareness of Flood Re.

This will be followed by a risk survey and specification for PFR.

Previsico will provide access to early warning flood alerts through their system and will also provide a flood sensor which will be fitted to the bridge that runs across the river.

Records will be maintained of the properties taking part in the trial and will be captured in the newly developed Flood Compliance platform (FCP).
