From strategy to delivery - the "how"...

- Clear communication and buy-in (culture): people need to understand the strategies and the "why", their role in achieving them, and have the support to do so
- Collaboration and partnership (relationships): Collaborate and co-produce to leverage collective expertise, resources, and knowledge.
- Robust implementation plan (embed): Develop comprehensive implementation plans that outline specific actions, timelines, responsibilities, and performance indicators for each strategy.
- Continuous evaluation and monitoring: Regularly evaluate progress, gather feedback, and monitor the impact of the strategies to ensure they remain aligned with evolving needs
